

REYKJAVIK (Dispatches) – An 11-year-old Palestinian boy with Duchenne muscular dystrophy was returned to Landspítali Hospital in Reykjavik on Monday after spending eight hours at Keflavik Airport, where he and his family were awaiting deportation to Spain. Police officers had taken Yazan Tamimi from the hospital's Rjodrid nursing and rehabilitation department late last night, where he was receiving care for his neurodegenerative condition. Yazan, who requires constant medical supervision, was asleep when the police arrived. The family's lawyer, Albert Bjorn Ludvigsson, expressed his outrage over the situation, stating that the deportation plan had been carried out without proper notification or due process.

# Resistance Movements Praise Yemeni Missile Strike on Israel

GAZA (Dispatches) – Palestinian resistance groups, including Hamas and Islamic Jihad, lauded a missile strike by Yemeni forces on an Israeli military target near Tel Aviv, marking it as a response to ongoing aggression by the Zionist regime in Gaza.

In a statement, Hamas referred to the missile attack as a “natural response to the Zionist entity’s aggression against our Palestinian people.”

“We affirm that the Zionist enemy will not enjoy security unless it ceases its brutal aggression against our people in the Gaza Strip,” the statement said.

Hamas highlighted the support from resistance fronts in Yemen, Lebanon, and Iraq, calling their efforts a legitimate right of the nation’s resistance.

“This also confirms the unity of our nation and its shared destiny in facing the Zionist project and its colonial dominance in Palestine and the Arab region,” the statement continued.

The Al-Qassam Brigades, the military wing of Hamas, echoed this sentiment when the spokesperson Abu Obeida expressed appreciation for the Yemeni people’s

stance, saying, “We deeply appreciate the stance of the dear Yemeni people alongside their Palestinian brethren and their readiness to offer sacrifices for this cause.”

Hamas further called for an end to Israeli aggression and the complete liberation of Palestine, urging global support for their cause.

“We renew our call to all free forces, peoples, and conscientious individuals of the world to continue their support until the aggression in Gaza is stopped and our people’s aspirations for national rights, liberating their land, and es-

tablishing a Palestinian state with al-Quds as its capital are fulfilled,” the statement added.

Separately, the Palestinian Islamic Jihad resistance movement commended the Yemeni missile strike, saying, “The courage displayed by the Yemeni people in facing American arrogance and Zionist tyranny reaffirms their commitment to supporting our Palestinian people.”

Lebanon’s Hezbollah resistance movement also praised Yemen’s operation in retaliation for the regime’s genocidal war on Gaza.

“The brave decision taken by the

honorable leadership of Yemen to respond to the aggression is a true expression of the general and unified stance of the axis of resistance on all fronts to proceed with supporting the oppressed Palestinian people and their honorable and valiant resistance to lift the injustice and suffering of them, and to stop the criminal and genocidal war,” Hezbollah said in a statement.

The movement added that the “qualitative” operation conducted by the Yemeni forces “exposed the weakness of this temporary entity at all levels.”

The statement came as the Yemeni armed forces on Sunday struck a military target in Jaffa area, south of Tel Aviv, with a new hypersonic ballistic missile.

Brigadier General Yahya Saree, the Yemeni army’s spokesman, said the long-range advanced projectile “managed to reach its target, and the enemy’s defense systems failed to intercept and confront it.”

Abdul-Malik al-Houthi, leader of Yemen’s Ansarullah resistance movement, said the recent Yemeni missile attack was part of the fifth phase of escalation against the Zionist regime.

## Report: Netanyahu Plans to Dismiss War Minister Amid Dispute Over Lebanon

WEST BANK (Dispatches) – The Zionist regime’s prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu is planning to dismiss war minister Yoav Gallant and replace him with Gideon Sa’ar, leader of the so-called National Right Party, according to a report on Monday.

Disagreements between Netanyahu and Gallant have surfaced over the regime’s approach to the growing border escalation with Hezbollah in southern Lebanon as Gallant advocates exhausting diplomatic efforts to de-escalate tensions, while Netanyahu is pushing for a large-scale military campaign.

“Negotiations between Netanyahu’s team and Sa’ar are ongoing to replace Gallant,” the Israeli public broadcaster KAN reported.

Sources in Netanyahu’s Likud Party, however, denied that any formal agreement has been reached.

Netanyahu’s office issued a statement denying media reports about negotiations with Sa’ar to replace Gallant as war minister.

Israeli Channel 12, citing unnamed sources close to Sa’ar, said, “There was nothing new in the

matter.”

Sa’ar, a former Likud member, founded his own party after splitting from Netanyahu in 2020 and has reemerged as a key figure in the occupying regime’s politics.

Gallant has been under fire from Netanyahu’s right-wing allies, including far-right minister Itamar Ben-Gvir.

“For many months, I have been calling on prime minister Netanyahu to fire Gallant, and the time has come to do so immediately. A decision must be made in the north and Gallant is not the right man to lead it,” Ben-Gvir posted on X.

The extremist minister argued that Gallant was not the right leader for military operations in Lebanon.

Sa’ar’s potential entry into the regime’s cabinet could signal new strategic approaches to both the Lebanon and Gaza conflicts.

Tensions have spiked along Lebanon’s border amid cross-border attacks between Hezbollah and Zionist troops as Tel Aviv pressed ahead with an onslaught against Gaza, which has killed over 41,200 people since last October.

## Hamas Urges Formation of National Consensus Gov’t

GAZA STRIP (Dispatches) – The Gaza Strip-based Palestinian resistance movement Hamas has called for formation of a “national consensus” government for administration of Palestinians’ affairs.

Sami Abu Zuhri, a senior Hamas’s spokesman, said such a government has to “include all Palestinian groups,” and administer the affairs of both Gaza and the occupied West Bank.

“We do not accept any discrimination between Gaza and the West Bank, and try towards [enabling] integrated administration of both territories by Palestinian groups,”

the official told Qatar’s Al Jazeera television network on Monday.

Zuhri also said Hamas would be consulting with the representatives of other Palestinian groups during pending negotiations in the Egyptian capital of Cairo concerning the manner of Gaza’s administration following conclusion of the Zionist regime’s ongoing war against the coastal sliver.

Back in January, the regime came up with a “day after plan” for Gaza that would hand its administration over to unnamed “Palestinian bodies,” while giving Tel Aviv security control over the territory.

Hamas, however, has repeatedly rejected the proposal.

The movement’s Deputy Political Bureau Chief Khalil al-Hayya asserted this earlier in September in remarks to Qatari Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman and Egyptian General Intelligence Minister Abbas Kamel.

Hamas rejects “any projects related to the post-aggression phase in the Gaza Strip,” he told the officials, whose countries have been mediating negotiations aimed at potential conclusion of a truce agreement that could bring an end to the October-present war.

“The management of the strip is a Palestinian internal affair to be agreed upon with a unified Palestinian vision,” Hayya noted.

Osama Hamdan, Hamas’s senior representative in Lebanon, also said recently that Palestinian groups had agreed on formation of a national consensus government during reconciliation talks that were held in Beijing earlier in the year.

The talks were partaken by representatives from Hamas and Fatah, another major Palestinian group, which operates offices in the West Bank.

## Four Columnists Quit Jewish Chronicle Over Gaza Coverage Based on ‘Wild Fabrications’

LONDON (Dispatches) – Four prominent columnists have resigned from the Jewish Chronicle (JC) after it published stories about the Zionist regime and its war on Gaza that were allegedly “wild fabrications.”

The JC, which is the oldest Jewish newspaper in the UK, published several articles by a reporter named Elon Perry that it has now removed. They are alleged to contain fabricated quotes from Zionist regime officials.

One of the articles claimed the discovery of a document from Gaza allegedly detailing Hamas leader Yahya Sinwar’s plans to escape with Israeli captives, using the Philadelphi Corridor as a route to Iran.

But the Zionist regime’s army said that it had no knowledge of such a document - and several Israeli outlets questioned Perry’s identity and professional background.

Given the similarity between Perry’s claims and statements made by prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu, some have speculated that this could be part of a broader disinformation

campaign.

On Saturday, amid mounting controversy, the JC removed his articles from its website. Jonathan Freedland, a senior columnist for the Guardian, said on Sunday that he was quitting the JC, which he has contributed to for 26 years.

“The latest scandal brings great disgrace on the paper - publishing fabricated stories and showing only the thinnest form of contrition - but it is only the latest,” he said in a letter to editor Jake Wallis Simmonds, posted on X. “Too often, the JC reads like a partisan, ideological instrument, its judgments political rather than journalistic.”

Journalist David Aaronovitch reposted Freedland’s letter and said, “I have done the same.”

Comedian and writer David Baddiel, meanwhile, has followed suit, with his spokesperson confirming that he has “no plans to write any more columns for the paper but there is no further comment at this stage.”

And Hadley Freeman, who writes for The Sunday Times, has left the paper too.

She told BBC Radio 4 on Monday morning that she and the other columnists who resigned “felt there had not been editorial standards” applied to Elon Perry “because this journalist adhered to an ideology that perhaps was similar to that of the editorial board”.

She added: “Jews represent a tiny, tiny percentage of the British population, less than one percent, and we want to have a liberal modern voice that represents British Jewish feelings... what it felt like, increasingly, was that the Jewish Chronicle was representing a more ideological rather than strictly journalistic point of view, and was becoming far more right wing and far more in step with Netanyahu - which most British Jews are not. “That’s not why I joined a British Jewish newspaper, to represent the views of Netanyahu. I want to represent the views of British Jews”.

## UNRWA: Gaza Polio Vaccination Coverage Reached 90%

GAZA (Dispatches) – Polio vaccination coverage in Gaza has reached 90 percent, the head of the United Nations Palestinian refugee agency said on Monday, adding that the next step was to ensure hundreds of thousands of children got a second dose at the end of the month.

The campaign to vaccinate some 640,000 children in Gaza under 10 years of age against polio, which began on Sept. 1, presented major challenges to UNRWA and its partners due to the ongoing aggression by the Zionist regime.

It followed confirmation by the World Health Organization (WHO) last month that a baby had been partially paralyzed by the type 2 polio virus, the first such case in the Palestinian territory in 25 years.

More than 446,000 Palestinian children in central and south Gaza were vaccinated earlier this month before a campaign to vaccinate a final 200,000

children in north Gaza began on September 10 despite access restrictions, evacuation orders and shortages of fuel.

The first round of the polio vaccination campaign in Gaza ended successfully, UNRWA’s chief Philippe Lazzarini said, adding that 90 percent of the enclave’s children had received a first dose.

“Parties to the conflict have largely respected the different required “humanitarian pauses” showing that when there is a political will, assistance can be provided without disruption. Our next challenge is to provide children with their second dose at the end of September,” he wrote on X.

The Zionist regime began its genocidal campaign in Gaza on Oct. 7 last year. The assault on Gaza has killed more than 41,000 Palestinians, according to the enclave’s health ministry, and reduced much of the territory to rubble.
